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Message from the Scout Executive...



Authenticity

I recently attended a training course where a Marketing Expert conducted training on how Organizations can and should put their “Best Foot Forward.” He used words like “Brand” and “Reputation”. The speaker defined “Brand” as what an organization says about itself. He defined “Reputation” as what others say about your organization. He went on to explain that “Authenticity” occurs when “brand” and “reputation” are in line. This made perfect sense to me, but it also raised the additional question, “How does one make that happen?” Fortunately, the speaker offered 8 principles for building authenticity in an organization.

- 1) Do what is “right” regardless of the circumstances
- 2) Consistent Performance.
- 3) Credible Communication. By “credible” he meant “accurate”.
- 4) Offer Better value and exceed expectations.
- 5) Take Care of your members/customers. They should be the focus.
- 6) Innovation. Organizations should be committed to continuous improvement.
- 7) Take care of employees and volunteers.
- 8) Positive Community Impact.

Individuals could argue for hours on whether or not these 8 principles are the best ways for an organization or group to build authenticity. However, I don’t think that anyone can argue that these 8 steps are not at least a credible road map for us to follow. Scouting has been around for 103 years. If we want to insure that we are around for the next 100 years, we are going to have to make sure that we maintain “authenticity”. This is true at every level of the organization. I encourage all of us to look at our areas of responsibility and strive to practice these 8 principles. Everyone -Den Leaders, Cub Masters, Scout Masters, Venture Crew Advisors, District Committee members, Commissioners, Council Board members, District Executives, clerical staff, Scout Executives, Primary Presidents, and Young Men’s Presidents, etc - all play a key role in maintaining authenticity. Both the current generation of boys that we are serving and the future generations count on us.

Thank you for what you do! All of you are making a tremendous difference in our community. I know that we face many challenges both in scouting and in the community at large. But, kids have never needed us more. When we are faced with the challenges that will invariably present themselves remember to think **“If not me, then who? And If not now, then when?”**

Members of Pack 513, chartered by the Mother Lode Gun Club out of the Soulsbyville area, spent over a week packed and ready to leave their homes since they were right on the border of the evacuation area. Fortunately, they did not have to evacuate.

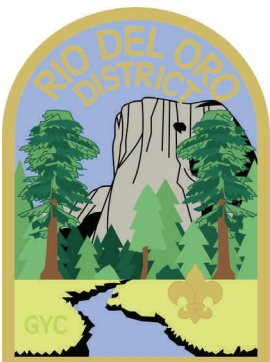


Troop 500, chartered by the Mount Calvary Lutheran Church from Mi-Wuk Village, gave service during the Rim Fire. They set up, bussed, and took down tables for two Twain Harte area fire personnel dinners. They served between 300 and 500 firefighters. Scouts and parents from the unit supplied food and drinks to firemen stationed on call in the neighborhoods on fire watch through the nights of the fire. It was an intense effort of support on the part of Troop 500.

Troop 570, chartered by the Tuolumne County Sheriff's Posse, gave service at the Mother Lode Fairgrounds in Sonora. School was dismissed for the week of the biggest threat from the fire. Rescued animals such as horses and cattle were brought to the fairgrounds that week to protect them. Members of Troop 570 helped to care for the animals during their time off from school. Caring for scared animals in this situation shows Scouts in action helping others in times of need.

Congratulations to the members of Pack 513 and Troops 500 and 570 for showing Scout courage and Scout Spirit in the face of the Rim Fire disaster.

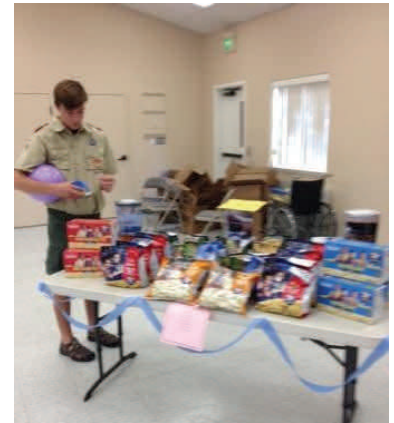
Recharter Packet

Rio del Oro BOY SCOUT TROOP HELPS IN RIM FIRE DISASTER RELIEF EFFORT

The Rim Fire, which by September 9th, the 24th day of the fire which had started August 17th, had already burned over 253,000 acres, primarily in eastern Tuolumne County. The fire caused thousands of residents to be temporarily evacuated, burned over a hundred structures including eleven residences, and shut down the tourist-oriented economy along Highway 120 west of Yosemite due to nearly three weeks of road closer. In all, this has been a disaster of major significance leaving many people in the vicinity of the fire in need of food, shelter, clothing and other items.

The people of Mariposa responded by donating tons of needed food, drinking water, clothing, and first aid items at two collecting points. One was at the New Life Christian Fellowship Church in Bootjack and the other was in front of the Pioneer Market in Mariposa on Friday, Saturday and Sunday of the Labor Day weekend where Boy Scout Troop 94 of Mariposa conducted a food drive.

The scouts handed out shopping lists to the people entering the market and explained that the purpose of the food drive was to help in the relief effort of the Rim Fire disaster. Many of the shoppers on their way out of the market handed the scouts bags of groceries, cases of drinking water, some paper products, baby and first aid items and more, plus over \$650 in cash donations which was not solicited. The scouts sorted the donated items, moved them over to a waiting truck and 18 foot trailer, and by Sunday afternoon had collected and loaded about a ton of food and supplies and 80 cases of drinking water which weighed about another ton.



At the conclusion of the food drive, this load was driven north Sunday evening (September 1st.) to the Amador-Tuolumne Community Action Agency Food Bank located in Jamestown. There the scouts unloaded the truck and trailer into waiting bins at the food bank. The receiving clerk at the food bank expressed his amazement to Scoutmaster Toney Gorham regarding the large quantity of donated food and items that the scouts had collected in just three days. The people of Mariposa were very generous in their assistance with this disaster relief effort, for which many people are very thankful.

Camp Minkalo History and Project

Camp Minkalo is in the El Dorado National Forrest, and it is located on the east side of Silver Lake off of Highway 88 near Kit Carson. The actual camp is located at the end of Kit Carson Road on the backside of Silver Lake at an altitude of about 7300 feet. The property had been a Council summer camp until the early 1990's when the lack of potable water caused the camp to be unusable.

Our Council was the last organization to hold a special use permit on this property, though not the first. Because we were the last holder of the permit, we are obligated by law to return the property to its original "state." There were 4 buildings remaining on the property that had to be torn down and hauled away. The Forrest Service has accepted the Council's plan to remove at least one building per year over a four-year period.

The weekend of October 7-9, 2011, was our first work weekend at Camp Minkalo. We were able to remove most of the one two-story building on that weekend. However, a portion of the debris was covered by snow and we were not able to remove all of it at that time. On the weekend on September 7-9, 2012, we were able to finish the debris removal of the two story building, and to begin working on another building. Our goal for 2013 is to remove the remaining 2 1/2 buildings and finish the project in full.

That's where YOU come in! The Council needs volunteers who are willing to work to go up on the weekend of September 27 - 29, 2013, along with folks who can provide vehicles, dump trailers, or other types of construction equipment that can aide with the demolition and removal of the camp buildings. The road into camp is very narrow, and therefore, too small for a large tri-axle. We will need to use pickup trucks and dump trailers to haul the wood and other debris out to the highway to dump it into a larger disposal trailer. If you are able to assist with the donation of the use of a truck, skid steer, dump trailer, or other piece of equipment, please contact Rich McCartney at the Council office. His e-mail is rmccartn@bsamail.org and his cell phone number is (209) 552-9749.

The Council will provide all meals at no cost to the participants as well as reserve camping sites at Silver Lake Campground – East (Amador Ranger District, Eldorado National Forest). This event will run from Friday evening through Sunday morning. A participation form is available at the end of the Newsletter -- please submit this form to the Council office no later than Monday afternoon, September 23rd, so we may adequately prepare for meals.

The location is beautiful. The camping will be great. If we have a large group, many hands will make lighter work. Our Goal is to have at least 50 volunteers which will allow us to have three separate crews. This will allow a crew to work on each of the remaining buildings as well as a few folks to drive and assist at the dumpsters. We could finish this project a year early with enough helping hands. This is a great opportunity to show cheerful service and have a good time too. We hope to see many of you at this event!

Training Resources

It is critical that all direct contact leaders get trained in their registered position. It has been shown to make units stronger both in their program but also their membership and finances. Knowing the resources available is a major part of this effort. Training gives the leader many resources that they may not know are available to them. It also teaches them the program that works for today's youth.

Fall is a strong training season and I encourage everyone to check out some of these resources for training.

The Greater Yosemite Calendar is a great place to start. Did you know there is an online version as well as the paper version? The Council has just put out a 17-month calendar that goes through 2014. Because this is a long time and as you know there are always changes, you should check out the online version and the listing of upcoming trainings.

Another Great resource is MyScouting (<http://myscouting.scouting.org>). It has training available online as well as tools that will let you check to see what training you have. Once you sign on to MyScouting just click on "training validation" and follow the instructions.

National BSA is also rolling out new tools with a new database for all of our records. This is a huge project. As functions and tools become available they are placing them on Myscouting tools (which is available from a link on the my scouting homepage. Your same username and password works on this site also. Please check out what is available to you on this constantly improving website. If you find a discrepancy in your records please call and let the Council know.

With these resources you should have an easier time at finding training and also getting trained for your currently registered position.

Commissioner Corner

Some parents and unit leaders have heard the term Commissioner and wondered what that means in the context of Scouting. Or, they have met a person who refers to themselves as Commissioner and he or she is not exactly sure what that means. So, we thought that a definition and instruction might be helpful.

First, Commissioners are district and council leaders who help Scout units succeed. They coach and consult with adult leaders of Cub Scout packs, Boy Scout troops, and Venturing crews. Commissioners help maintain the standards of the Boy Scouts of America.

Unit Commissioners focus on the following four primary areas:

1. **Supporting unit growth in the Journey to Excellence (JTE) criteria:** JTE measures performance characteristics that unlock the door to a successful unit. Commissioners should analyze the unit's program and identify JTE areas where help is needed to move the unit to a higher level of JTE success.
2. **Linking district committee resources to the unit:** Commissioners should support the district committee's delivery of a "catalog of services" to support the specific JTE elements needed for a particular unit's health and success.
3. **Visiting units and logging the visits into the Unit Visit Tracking System (UVTS):** Commissioners' core task remains visiting the unit. UVTS input feeds critical information to the district committee to help link resources to the unit.
4. **Supporting on-time charter renewal:** The commissioner's focus is the retention of the unit, though they should be especially mindful of supporting new youth membership efforts as they move more toward a volunteer-led, professionally-guided approach to increasing membership.

If you are a unit leader and you have not yet met your unit commissioner or you are not sure who that person is, please contact your District Commissioner or District Executive so that we can help make that acquaintance. Likewise, if you are a parent or veteran unit leader and you think that you would like to serve in this critical role for your own unit or another unit, please contact your district commissioner or District Executive and let them know about your interest. We are looking for good people who care about making units successful. No prior experience is required.

Snake Bite Poster Available

The American Association of Poison Control Centers would like to offer its new poster on snake bite safety to Scouts and Scouters free of charge. A proof of the poster can be found below. The poster features information about what to do, and what not to do, in the event of a snake bite as well as information on how to identify venomous snakes. It also features a map of the United States that shows where venomous snakes live and information about the poison help line.

In the spirit of KNOW risk vs. NO risk, we can all take a tip from the Boy Scout Handbook: *“Being able to identify venomous snakes is a good first step toward staying safe where they live. If you leave snakes alone, they are likely to avoid you, too. Use a hiking stick to poke among stones and brush ahead of you when you walk through areas where snakes are common. Be careful where you put your hands as you collect firewood or climb over rocks and logs.”* page 142

WATCH OUT *for* SNAKES!

If a SNAKE BITES you:

- Remain calm & call the Poison Help line immediately.
1-800-222-1222
- Immobilize the bitten limb or body part at or slightly below heart level.
- Note the time the bite happened.
- Remove all tight clothing or jewelry.
- Wash the bite area with soap and water if it does not cause delay.
- Get to a hospital as quickly as possible, preferably by ambulance.

Do

- Don't try to capture or kill the snake, but try to remember its color and shape so you can describe it, which will help in your treatment. If you can do so safely and without delay, take a photo.
- Don't use a tourniquet.
- Don't use any form of suction.
- Don't cut the wound.
- Don't apply heat, cold, electricity or any substances to the bite.
- Don't drink caffeine or alcohol or take any drugs.

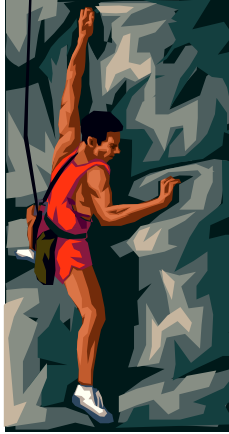

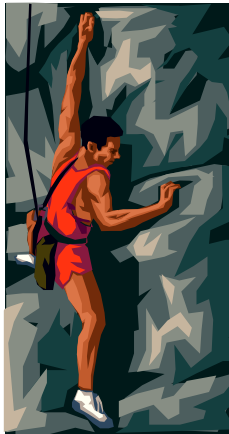

WATCH OUT *for* SNAKES!

If a SNAKE BITES you:

- Remain calm & call the Poison Help line immediately.

1-800-222-1222

- Immobilize the bitten limb or body part at or slightly below heart level.
- Note the time the bite happened.
- Remove all tight clothing or jewelry.
- Wash the bite area with soap and water if it does not cause delay.
- Get to a hospital as quickly as possible, preferably by ambulance.

Do

- Don't try to capture or kill the snake, but try to remember its color and shape so you can describe it, which will help in your treatment. If you can do so safely and without delay, take a photo.

- Don't use a tourniquet.

- Don't use any form of suction.

- Don't cut the wound.

- Don't apply heat, cold, electricity or any substances to the bite.

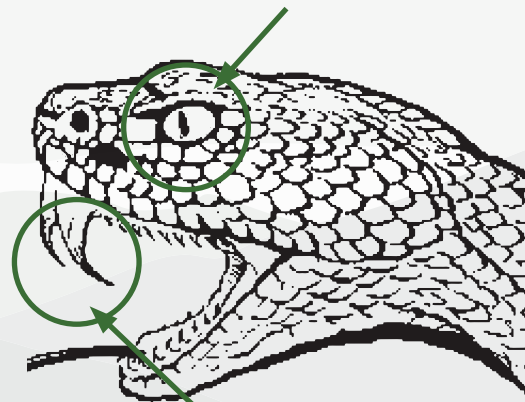

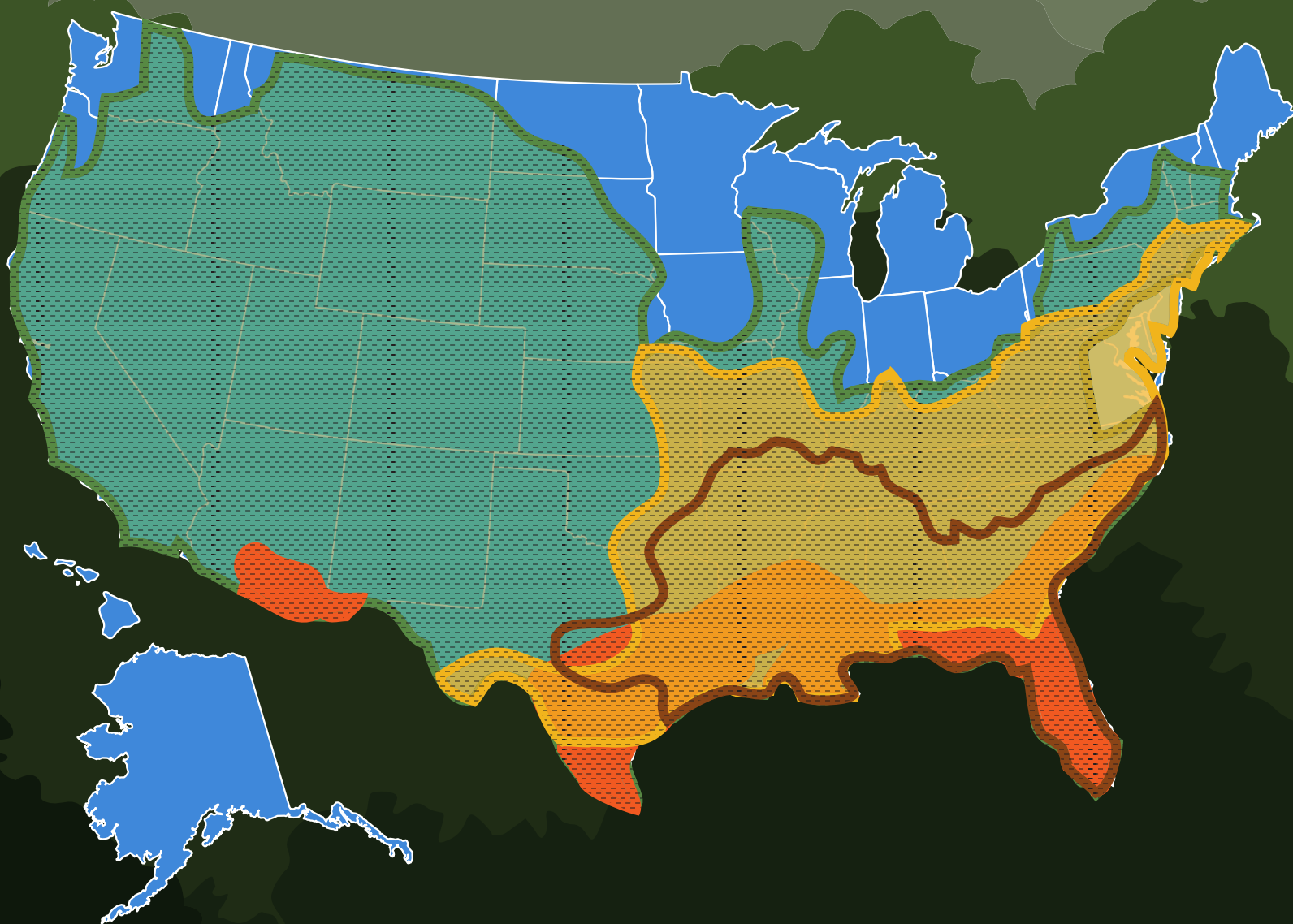

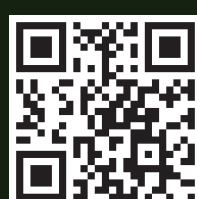
Symptoms and Signs of a SNAKE BITE:

- Intense pain spreading out from the bite
- A scratch or puncture(s) from fangs
- Progressive swelling and bruising where bitten
- Sweating
- Weakness
- Nausea and vomiting
- Muscle twitching
- Metallic taste in mouth
- Light-headedness or loss of consciousness
